Scope

"Specifically, I am interested in the average funding packages for individuals diagnosed with Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD) and Complex Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (C-PTSD). Any documents with the recent overall number of participants with these diagnoses, whether primary or secondary, would also be rather insightful. I do not require any personal information of the participants."

Response

Our publicly available data cube [Participants count by diagnosis data \(CSV 993KB\)](#) contains the following information:

The definition of Primary and Reported can be found in the [Participants count by diagnosis data rules \(DOCX 92KB\)](#):

Primary: Number of participants where the disability was recorded as primary. Only one disability can be recorded as primary.

Reported: Number of participants who reported disability (including primary or non-primary disabilities). More than one disability can be listed for each participant.

The average annualised plan budget for participants with a [primary](#) disability of F43 and F60.3 are \$80,900 and \$120,400 (rounded to the nearest hundred) respectively.

Note that:

1. While the question is specifically asking for Complex Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (C-PTSD), the category of F43 - Post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) should likely include participants with varying types of PTSD and [NOT](#) exclusively C-PTSD.
2. Prior to 2020, participants with PTSD were previously included in F99 - Other Psychosocial disabilities and some participants with C-PTSD may also remain in this category.
3. Regarding participants with F43 and F60.3 as non-primary disability, average annualised plan budgets were not shown for these participants. This is because there is currently a lack of guidance over the definition of a non-primary disability and the level of evidence required to support entry onto the system, which has led to inconsistent reporting of non-primary disabilities.
