Dear Mr Stonestreet and all Councillors,

Thank you very much for your time.

We write to you out of deep concern for your approval of the slaughter of the local kangaroos and their young on your land at the Griffith Golf Course and now the Griffith Jockey Club.

You may not be aware but kangaroo "culls" are not humane, despite popular belief to the contrary. Kangaroos are family animals with close family bonds, not unlike humans, and complex social structures which are destroyed by large scale shooting programs such as the ones approved by your council at the Griffith Jockey Club and previously at the golf club. When a pregnant female kangaroo is killed during these large scale government authorised culls, research on professional shooters has shown that her at-foot (out of pouch) baby is orphaned and left to die from stress, starvation, exposure and predation (RSPCA, 2002, Sharp & McLeod, 2014). Her pouch baby is bludgeoned to death (Code of Practice, Aust.Govt) using horrific practices such as stomping on their head, smashing them over a toe bar, ute tray or rock, with research showing professional shooters never check if the joey has died before throwing the orphan to the ground and walking away (McLeod & Sharp, 2014). Kangaroo "culls" are brutal and shameful practices that are cruel and unnecessary in the 21st century.

With the advancement of development and housing in regional Australia as well as the ongoing slaughter of kangaroo populations by commercial industries in their meat and skins, kangaroos are unable to find sanctuary on most of the land in regional Australia, forced into smaller and smaller pockets within rural communities which often includes public land such as golf courses and parks. Kangaroos are an integral part of our environment essential for the regeneration of native grasses, the control of introduced invasive herbivores such as rabbits, and the management of the forest under story to reduce the risk of wildfire. They are also a massive income earner for regional communities as a tourist attraction and according to the Sustainable Tourism Research Centre, kangaroos are estimated to be worth between two and five billion dollars in annual tourism revenue. They are also the second most recognised tourist symbol in the world and one of the most important reasons foreigners visit Australia according to surveys done at international airports.

When looking further into the particular issue facing the Griffith Jockey Club, we note from the media report that the golf course is regularly authorised to kill large numbers of

kangaroos and their young, and with the golf course being next door to the racing track, we suspect this could be forcing kangaroos onto the race track as they attempt to find refuge from shooting at the golf course. To completely remove the risk of kangaroos on the race track you would need to remove every last kangaroo in the area which would be neither ethical nor practical. Non lethal measures to address any safety issues at the race track could include re-examining the regular shooting of kangaroos at the adjacent golf course which is undoubtedly significantly contributing to the problem at the race track by forcing kangaroos there as they attempt to find sanctuary. Kangaroos should not present any significant safety or environmental issue for the golf course with kangaroos mostly grazing the course at night, then moving under cover during the day. There are hundreds of golf courses across Australia that enjoy kangaroos at their club without any significant complications or concerns. In particular Angelsea Golf Club in Victoria is proud of their resident kangaroos and never shoots them. In fact many country golf courses pride themselves on their kangaroos and use them as a tourist attraction. Therefore we are interested to know what is the main issue affecting the golf course that they feel the need to kill the kangaroos on a regular basis, and what alternative more effective measures could be considered to avoid it that may in turn reduce the number of kangaroos moving onto the race track as a result.

Despite common myths, kangaroos breed very slowly with each female only able to give birth to one joey every 12 months, which then takes another 18 months to fully wean. Most joeys perish (70%) and with around 50% of joeys taken by foxes alone, this makes them a very slow growing animal. Research shows that kangaroos only increase at a rate of around 9% per year after which they stabilise/plateau in accordance with their environment. Kangaroos do not explode or overbreed unlike popular myth would have us believe.

In regard to the race track, there are numerous race tracks across Australia that have kangaroos in the vicinity that do not resort to shooting the local wildlife. Non lethal strategies they employ include fencing around the track with or without gates that can be closed before the race starts with the kangaroos herded out prior. The gates can then be opened again after the race is finished. Even without fencing, kangaroos can easily (slowly and gently) be herded off the track before the race starts to ensure the track is clear and are unlikely to return while the public, noise, racing etc is underway. Obviously their return would need to be monitored throughout the race but this practice should prove successful if done professionally and consistently before and during the race. This has been done for the past three races at Mt Panorama by the Bathurst Council with great success. The council erected a large fence around the perimeter of the track and using local kangaroo experts they gently and slowly herded the kangaroos off the track before the race, with no incidents on the track for the past three races as a result. The Bathurst Kangaroo Project has also conducted extensive research at Mt Panorama and compiled a significant amount of evidence on the movements of kangaroos around the track. They have found that risk is not associated with the number of kangaroos in the area, but the stress response of the kangaroos to noise and external events. Therefore shooting a proportion of the population is unlikely to achieve the desired outcome at Griffith race track. The Bathurst Kangaroo Project scientists are now working with the Bathurst Council to ensure the success of the non lethal programs continues at their race track.

There are numerous other devices used by airports and other councils such as bird scare guns and electronic and ultra sonic devices which deter the kangaroos away from the track/runway as required. Jandacott Airport in Western Australia uses these non lethal measures along with fencing, and Bathurst Council and Macedon Ranges Council has constructed appropriate barrier fencing as well as employing experts to move the kangaroos off the track prior to and during the race. Non lethal measures such as these as an

alternative to lethal kangaroo programs are certainly more ethical, socially acceptable, practical and long term. Killing on the other hand is neither ethical, humane or long term.

We would be happy to offer our services further if you would like more information or advice, and we could also connect you with the volunteer scientists at the Bathurst Kangaroo Project if you would like to learn more about their research on the kangaroos at Mount Panorama and how they could assist you in mitigating any risks at the race track. In the meantime however we urge you to please reconsider these killing programs and consider the humane, long term and ethical strategies now available.

CL02 DALTON PARK

Mr Craig reported the following:

- Operational expenditure as of 23 June 2016 was \$76,213 versus budget of \$54,519 and that the operational income of was \$19,218 versus budget of \$15,130.
- In relation to Mr Conroy's enquiry regarding the impact of the increase in bond fee on the hire of the facility (the bond increased from \$300 to \$1,200 on 1 July 2015), the following results include: 2013 = 4 functions held, 2014 = 11 functions held, 2015 = 5 functions held and to date in 2016 = 1 function held and 2 bookings for later in 2016.
- Mr Craig reported that the increased bond fee has resulted in the facility being utilised in a manner that places greater responsibility on the hirer to strictly adhere to all aspects of the agreement.
- Discussion took place on the format of the financial statement and the question was raised if the report could be a little more specific in itemising expenditure items.

RECOMMENDED on the motion of Denis Conroy and Councillor Bill Lancaster that the Committee note the information in the report and the financial position.

CL03 EMAIL RECEIVED FROM THE AUSTRALIAN SOCIETY FOR KANGAROOS

The Chair called on comments in relation to the email (attached to the report) received from the Australian Society for Kangaroos.

Mr Chugha advised that the President of the Australian Society for Kangaroos was written to advising of the recommendation of the General Facilities Committee, "that the proposal to cull the number of kangaroos that frequent Dalton Park be accepted provided that the Griffith Jockey Club obtain approval from the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Services to obtain 200 tags, they met all the requirements of the approval and that they notify neighbours."

Mr Chugha further advised that a letter has been forwarded to the Griffith Jockey Club seeking a copy of the approval from the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Services which will then be referred to the General Facilities Committee for further consideration.

Mrs Kidd on behalf of the Griffith Jockey Club Inc. tabled a letter from the Office of Environment & Heritage NSW National Parks & Wildlife Services advising that a licence will be issued to cull the animals based on a number of considerations, being:

- The licence will be issued in mid-August 2016, as the Griffith Race Meeting is to be held on the 10 September 2016.
- Issuing the licence closer to the date will mean that this method of control will be the most effective.
- Griffith Jockey Club Inc. needs to obtain a letter of support from the Griffith City Council (as the land owners) and forward to NPWS Mid West Area office.
- Griffith Jockey Club Inc. needs to carefully consider this method of control and consult with the NSW Police regarding the discharging of firearms in close proximity to other stakeholders of Dalton Park, the Griffith Golf Club and Griffith Airport.

The Chair advised that in the long term, culling would improve the safety of the area with the situation then being re-assessed over a period of time to determine its effectiveness.

The Chair stated that he would liaise with Mr Bernie Connelly in relation to discussions held at the previous General Facilities Committee whereby Mr Connelly is to present an action plan to the Committee.

Mr Craig enquired about the disposal of carcasses.

Mr Craig took the question on notice and stated that this will be looked at as part of the action plan.

RECOMMENDED on the motion of Councillor Bill Lancaster and Councillor Mike Neville that the Committee endorse the culling of kangaroos at Dalton Park in accordance with the Griffith Jockey Club's approval from the Office of Environment & Heritage NSW National Parks & Wildlife Services and that the Chair liaise with Mr Connelly regarding the action plan including the disposal of carcasses.

CL04 SENIOR CITIZENS CENTRE UPDATE

Mrs Krzus advised that the extensions to the storeroom were progressing, however wet conditions has delayed the project somewhat. Roof trusses, wall frames and colorbond has been ordered with delivery expected within the next few weeks. This will be followed by the erection of the roof and walls.

Mr Anson continues to provide a newsletter on a regular basis updating volunteers and staff on the progress of the construction.

Mrs Krzus advised that long time serving committee member, Mrs Dot Reddacliff tendered her resignation from the Senior Citizens Centre Working Group, having served on the Committee for over 25 years.

Reference was made to the minutes of the Senior Citizens' Centre Working Group Meeting held on 23 June 2016 and Council's position should the defibrillator belonging to the Griffith Aged Support Services be stored on site.

The Chair tabled a letter received from U3A, dated 4 July 2016 applauding the initiative of the Griffith Aged Support Services to have a defibrillator made available at the Senior Citizens Centre (copy of letter attached). The letter stated that U3A support the proposal that the defibrillator be mounted on a wall at the Centre and recommended that all groups using the Centre be encouraged to have at least one of their members undertake basic first aid training to ensure proper use of the defibrillator.

Discussion took place on the consequences of the defibrillator being stored at the Centre including: who would be responsible for training users to use the defibrillator, security of the unit, if damaged who would be responsible for repairing/recalibration of the unit, who would be responsible for ongoing maintenance costs eg replacing battery & purchase of disposable accessories, if located in a locked cupboard what happens if the person with the key is not present at the Centre when there is a need to use the unit, what groups (some or all groups) would have keys to the locked cupboard.

The Chair advised that the Griffith Aged Support Services' defibrillator was part funded through the Community Grant Program and that the condition of funding was that the unit be mobile.

RECOMMENDED on the motion of Councillor Mike Neville and Denis Conroy that:

- (a) The Committee note the report and the minutes of the Senior Citizens Centre Working Group Meeting of 23 June 2016.
- (b) The Committee not endorse the defibrillator unit being stored at the Senior Citizens Centre and that should U3A wish to use the defibrillator they make arrangements with the Griffith Aged Support Services to collect and return the unit to them following each hire.
- (c) A letter of thanks be sent from the Mayor and the General Manager to Mrs Dot Reddacliff thanking her for her dedication, support and contribution to the Senior Citizens Centre Working Group for over 25 years.
