### Access to documents under the Freedom of information Act 1982

I refer to your email dated 26 December 2017, seeking access to documents under the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (Cth) (the Act) regarding comments made by a CASA spokesman in an article in *The Australian* on 23 December 2017, specifically regarding positive feedback received by CASA relating to flying schools transitioning to the Part 141 requirements of the *Civil Aviation Safety Regulations 1998*.

# Decision

I am the decision maker for your request. I have identified 5 documents comprising 13 pages that are within the scope of your request. I have decided to release the documents to you, and they are enclosed with this letter. Document 1 contains material that is outside the scope of your request, and this part of the document has been redacted accordingly, in accordance with s 22 of the FOI Act.

Hi Peter

The attached letter was a DRAFT CEO response to AOPA on a similar issue. Steve Campbell had lead on the issue.

CASA initially identified a total of 311 organisations that might have needed to transition to an approval under Parts 141 or 142 of CASR.

CASA has completed 35 assessments, has 38 assessments underway and has identified 60 organisations that will not require an approval. I don't believe that we have previously made these figures publicly available.

As the letter identifies, during development of the regulations Part 141 was simplified and CASA has provided sample manuals, sample syllabi and a tool to assist in manual authoring. Similar assistance is being provided for Part 142.

CASA has also initiated a number of exemptions and approvals to resolve industry issues; the exemptions will be incorporated into a future amendment of the regulation and Manual of Standards.



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



# Meeting on Discussion Paper: Independent Flight Instructors

Thank you for your meeting on 14 November 2017 about the above Discussion Paper from AOPA Australia in regards to the concept of independent instructors. As Shane is on leave at the moment he has asked me to review the proposal and respond on his behalf.

As you would no doubt be aware, CASR Parts 141 and 142 were consulted over a number of years. It is my understanding that the concept of independent instructors was raised during the consultation period but that it was not progressed.

During the review of Parts 141 and 142, a number of policy changes were made that resulted in a much easier and cost efficient transition for flying schools. Policies such as only requiring a Part 141 Certificate rather than an Air Operators Certificate and producing the Part 141 Sample Operations Manual (SOM) which included associated training syllabuses, means that a non-complex flying school would only need to 'top and tail' the SOM to produce their own operations manual.

The SOM also highlighted a subtle but very important policy shift which addresses some of the concerns you have raised about accessibility in remote areas for instructors, such as the simpler approach to using temporary locations for training. Previously, approval was required from CASA, however now it is as simple as the operator assessing the suitability and familiarity of an aerodrome as described in the SOM at 1A1.6.4-Temporary locations.

For those who wish to own and operate their own flying school business, the process has never been easier. There have been a number of flying schools making the transition to Part 141 recently and the feedback I am receiving is very positive. CASA's sample manuals and syllabuses together with the Manual Authoring and Assessment Tool have helped operators with their transition. Turnaround times have reduced to around one to two months on average which not only reduces cost for industry but also time away from their core business of flying training.

It is for these reasons that I am satisfied that the Part 141 scheme and the available support tools address the concerns you have raised about accessibility in remote areas for instructors. I have therefore concluded that there is no need to make changes to policy or regulations at this time.

Once again thank you for meeting with CASA.

Hi Jason,

As requested please see below a sample of some successful Part 141/142 transitions.

If you require a few more or further detail than what has been outline let me know and I can attempt to flesh it out a little.

## Vee H Aviation Pty Ltd - first operator to complete transition

Vee H was the first operator and first CAR217 organisation to transition to 141 and 142 was completed in December 2016. Excellent working relationship between the operator and oversighting CTM.

# Oxford Aviation Academy - first large scale flight training school to transition

- Transition involved substantial partnership between CASA and operator to resolve areas of concern

# Kelmac Aviation - Completed

- Proactively worked with Operator to complete transition to Part 141. Total of 9 hrs assessment and the operator is now fully transitioned. Operator used the 141 SOM.

# Eastern Australia Airlines and Sunstate Airlines (Qantaslink) - Completed

- Transition of these major operators completed relatively early in the transition period. Inspectors worked closely with the organisation and a total of 12 hours on each operator achieved successful transition to Part 142

#### Surveillance Australia - Completed

- Complex Part 142 transition completed in 20hrs achieved through the inspector/CTM working closely with the organisation to achieve the transition goal. One of the first operators to be approved to undertake MCC training with their pilots.

#### **Barkly Helicopters - Completed**

- Inspectors completed successful transition of this operator to Part 141 despite the uncertainty around helicopter training and the continuation of the 105 hr training course

# **Heliservices Queensland Pty Ltd - Completed**

- Inspectors completed successful transition of this operator to Part 141 despite the uncertainty around helicopter training and the continuation of the 105 hr training course

# Lifeflight Group Limited - Completed

- Complex training organisation with complex type rated helicopters, training completed at the same time as managing significant changes to AOC and training approvals. Proactive working relationship between the regional office and company staff.

# JD and KM Jarden Pty Ltd - Completed

Proactive approach with operator, two inspectors from Southern Region conducted onsite visits to work
proactively with the operator to ensure transition documents completed against new regulations to make
transition seamless as possible.

# A C Airways Pty Ltd - In Progress

- Inspector in Southern Region working continuously with this operator to ascertain their transition objectives and assist them in the direction they need to go. Proactive discussions leading to restored faith in CASA that we are proactively working with them to achieve transition.

#### Aerowasp Pty Ltd - In progress

- Operator transition close to completed, total assessment hours spent to date 3 hrs, inspector has worked closed with operator in provision of documents.
