Tips to help you access information from NSW government agencies

What rights do I have to access government information in New South Wales?

In NSW, you have a legal right to access government information under the *Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009* – or the GIPA Act.

What does the law do?

The GIPA Act sets out the rules about how you can access information from government agencies.

This can be information on how a government agency works or your own personal information.

Who does the law apply to?

All government agencies in NSW, including:

- government departments
- local councils
- state-owned businesses
- universities
- Ministers and their staff.

How can I get information?

Go to the government agency that is most likely to hold the information you need.

The easiest ways to do this are to:

- 1. look on the agency website to see if the information is available or
- 2. contact the agency and ask for the information.

How might agencies respond to requests for information?

- A lot of information will be on their website. If you don't have the internet you can ask them to check and give you a copy.
- **2.** Much information is easily available. If it is, the agency should be able to tell you how and where you can get the information.
- If you ask for your own personal information and it does not involve other people's information and is easy to find, the agency should just give it to you.
- **4.** If you can't get your information any other way you might have to make a formal application. There is normally a fee for this.

How do I make a formal application?

You can ask the agency if they have an application form, otherwise these are the steps to follow:

- · put your application in writing
- say that it is under the GIPA Act
- include your postal address
- explain the information you want
- pay the application fee of \$30.

What if I can't pay the fees?

Talk to the agency and ask if they can help you. If you are a pensioner or you are struggling financially the agency may halve the fee.

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How long should my application take?

- 20 working days.
- If the agency needs to talk to another person or find information stored in archives it might take an extra 10 to 15 days.
- If it takes longer than this the agency should give your money back.

What if I don't get the information I wanted?

You can ask the Information Commissioner to review the decision by contacting the Information and Privacy Commission.

How can we help you?

We can help you get government information by:

- · telling you what your rights are
- helping you find the right agency
- helping you fill out an application form
- explaining what to expect how to apply, how long it should take, how much it should cost
- reviewing the agency's decision if they don't give you the information you asked for in your formal application.
