Your Freedom of Information request

An example of this document can be seen in FOI request CRM2018/606. These documents appear to provide an update of the number of irregular migrants intercepted in foreign jurisdictions.

I am not requesting correspondence or emails regarding these documents, only the documents themselves.

I assume these documents are produced periodically. Please provide all documents from 18 September 2018 until the most recent update."

Attached at Annexure A to this letter is my decision and statement of reasons for that decision. A "Schedule of Documents" identified as falling into the scope of your request is at Annexure B.

STATEMENT OF REASONS RELATING TO AN FOI REQUEST BY ASHER HIRSCH

I, Helen Drew, Coordinator, Freedom of Information Team, am an officer authorised under section 23 of the Act to make decisions in relation to the AFP.

What follows is my decision and reasons for the decision in relation to your application.

BACKGROUND

On 9 August 2018, this office received your application in which you requested:

"Please provide the all documents with the title of "FLEA DISRUPTIONS".

An example of this document can be seen in FOI request CRM2018/606. These documents appear to provide an update of the number of irregular migrants intercepted in foreign jurisdictions.

I am not requesting correspondence or emails regarding these documents, only the documents themselves.

I assume these documents are produced periodically. Please provide all documents from 18 September 2018 until the most recent update."

On 3 September 2018, you provided the following clarifying information regarding the scope of your request:

"All I am seeking is access to the documents titled FLEA Disruptions (and all available dated versions of this document), as provided via FOI request CRM2018/606. This released document is also available online here on page 16:

https://www.righttoknow.org.au/request/4520/response/12868/attach/4/Decision%20letter %20and%20documents%20HIRSCH%202018%20577.pdf

Another example of a similar document is released by DIBP here: https://www.righttoknow.org.au/request/4655/response/12795/attach/3/FA180600871%20 document%20to%20be%20released.pdf

These documents appear to be updated on a periodic basis. As such I am requesting all documents from 18 September 2013 until 3 September 2018, or as recent as possible.

These documents appear to provide an update on the number of people smuggling activities intercepted. As such, I agree to limit the request to people smuggling disruptions.

You can further limit the request to only the various dated versions of this document. I am not requesting any other documents other than these reports."

On 21 September 2018, you were advised by the Department of Home Affairs that under s 16 of the Act, the AFP accepted the transfer of your request to their Department dated 9 August 2018 as the documents subject to the request are in the possession of the AFP.

Pursuant to Section 24(2) of the Act, I decided that your requests would be treated as a single request, as they are substantially similar.

SEARCHES

In relation to this application, a search was undertaken by the AFP's Crime Operations Portfolio for the information relevant to the scope of the request.

DECISION

I have identified 15 documents relevant to your request. A schedule of the documents and details of my decision in relation to the documents is at Annexure B.

I have decided that the documents itemised at Annexure B are released to you in their entirety.

WAIVER OF CHARGES

Given that the request has exceeded the statutory timeframe as outlined at Section 15 of the Act, the AFP is not able to impose any fees or charges as outlined at Regulation 5(2)&(3) of the Freedom of Information (Charges) Regulations 1982.

EVIDENCE/MATERIAL ON WHICH MY FINDINGS WERE BASED

In reaching my decision, I have relied on the following documentary evidence:

- the scope of your application;
- the contents of the documents listed in the attached schedule;
- advice from AFP officers with responsibility for matters relating to the documents to which you sought access;
- Freedom of Information Act 1982; and
- Guidelines issued by the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner.

REVIEW AND COMPLAINT RIGHTS

If you are dissatisfied with a Freedom of Information decision made by the Australian Federal Police, you can apply for an internal or Information Commissioner (IC) Review. You do not have to apply for Internal Review before seeking an IC review.

You do not need to seek a review by either the AFP or the IC should you wish to complain about the AFP's actions in processing your request.

REVIEW RIGHTS under Part VI of the Act

Internal Review by the AFP

Section 53A of the Act gives you the right to apply for an internal review in writing to the Australian Federal Police (AFP) within 30 days of being notified of a decision. No particular

form is required. It would assist the independent AFP decision-maker responsible for the internal review if you set out in the application, the grounds on which you consider that the decision should be reviewed.

Section 54B of the Act provides that the internal review submission must be made within 30 days. Applications for a review of the decision should be addressed to:

REVIEW RIGHTS under Part VII of the Act

Review by the Information Commissioner (IC)

Alternatively, Section 54L of the Act gives you the right to apply directly to the IC or following an internal review by the AFP. In making your application you will need to provide an address for notices to be sent (this can be an email address) and a copy of the AFP decision. It would also help if you set out the reasons for review in your application.

Section 54S of the Act provides for the timeframes for an IC review submission. For an *access* refusal decision covered by subsection 54L(2), the application must be made within 60 days. For an access grant decision covered by subsection 54M(2), the application must be made within 30 days.

Further, the OAIC encourages parties to an IC review to resolve their dispute informally, and encourages agencies to consider possible compromises or alternative solutions to the dispute in this matter. The AFP would be pleased to assist you in this regard.

RIGHT TO COMPLAIN under Part VIIB of the Act

Section 70 of the Act provides that a person may complain to the IC about action taken by the Australian Federal Police in relation to your application.

A complaint to the IC may be made in writing and identify the agency against which the complaint is made.

The IC may be contacted on 1300 363 992. There is no particular form required to make a complaint, but the complaint should set out the grounds on which you consider the action should be investigated.
