**KEY ISSUES:**

3. The lapsing of these provisions, in conjunction with the emergence of new compression standards, such as MPEG-4 and digital television technologies such as hybrid broadcast broadband television (HbbTV) (MT2013/0265 refers), provides an opportunity to consider the broader policy issues surrounding the future regulation of digital television and its place in a converged environment. The Department intends to undertake consultation with relevant stakeholders to gauge their views on many of these technical regulatory issues in the first half of 2014.

To date, broadcasters have expressed an interest in \$47C
and migrating all broadcasting and datacasting services to MPEG-4. As noted in earlier briefing, not all digital receivers in homes can receive services using MPEG-4, although that is likely to improve over time as most retail equipment is now MPEG-4 capable.
ISSUES
The completion of digital switchover process, and the lapsing of a number of rules that have governed the provision of free-to-air digital television services to date, provides the Government with an opportunity to consider how these services should be regulated in the future. Some of the policy ssues that will need to be examined in this context are highlighted by the following questions:
