Freedom of Information (FOI) request - Access Decision

On 23 October 2019, the Department of Home Affairs (the Department) received a request for access to documents under the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (the FOI Act).

The purpose of this letter is to provide you with a decision on your request for access under the FOI Act.

1 Scope of request

You have requested access to the following documents:

Statistics on the number of asylum requests made to Airline Liaison Officers stationed in foreign airports for the financial years 2017-18 to 2018-19.

2 Authority to make decision

I am an officer authorised under section 23 of the FOI Act to make decisions in respect of requests to access documents or to amend or annotate records.

3 Relevant material

In reaching my decision I referred to the following:

- the terms of your request
- the FOI Act
- Guidelines published by the Office of the Information Commissioner under section 93A of the FOI Act (the FOI Guidelines)

4 Documents in scope of request

The Department has undertaken reasonable searches in relation to the documents you have requested access to.

Having regard to your request and the types of documents that may fall within the scope of your request I am satisfied that the searches conducted were extremely thorough and all reasonable steps have been taken to locate any document relevant to your request.

It is noted that claim for asylum for Australia cannot be made offshore and the application must be made in Australia first. If a traveller was to approach an Airline Liaison Officer (ALO) stationed in a foreign airport, the ALO would refer the person to the office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), to the appropriate diplomatic missions, or to an appropriate local Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO).

5 Decision

Section 24A of the FOI Act provides that the Department may refuse a request for access to a document if all reasonable steps have been taken to find the document and the Department is satisfied that the document does not exist.

I am satisfied that no documents were in the possession of the Department on 23 October 2019 when your FOI request was received. As such I am refusing access to the documents requested by you based on the application of section 24A of the FOI Act.

7 Your Review Rights

Internal Review

If you disagree with this decision, you have the right to apply for an internal review by the Department of this decision. The internal review will be carried out by an officer other than the original decision maker and the Department must make a review decision within 30 days.
