Re: Freedom of Information Request

I am writing to provide you a decision about your request under the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (FOI Act). I regret the delay in finalising this decision and thank you for your patience

I have identified documents relevant to your request and, after careful consideration, I have decided to release the documents in part.

Request

On 14 September 2020, you requested:

"A document that contains the position titles of officers who were non-ongoing or receiving high duties at any time in the last month

The job advertisement or expression of interest used to appoint officers in nonongoing positions or on higher duties."

I am an officer authorised under <u>section 23 of the FOI Act</u> to make decisions in relation to FOI requests.

In making my decision I have taken into account the terms of your request, the documents found to be within the scope of your request, the FOI Act, and the Australian Information Commissioner's guidelines issued under section 93A of the FOI Act.

The reasons for my decision and for the application of exemptions under the FOI Act to some documents are set out below. Where I refer to sections of the FOI Act, these are available at www.legislation.gov.au.

Reasons

Management of personnel

Parts of the Position Descriptions used for appointing officers in non-ongoing positions or on higher duties and parts of the list of non-ongoing postions, are conditionally exempt as release would, or could reasonably expected to, have a substantial adverse effect on the management of personnel by the department (section 47E(c) of the FOI Act).

The Position Descriptions include details about the department's operating environment and priorities, including engagement with foreign governments. The list of non-ongoing positions includes the titles of positions occupied by identifiable individuals. Disclosure of this material could reasonably be expected to impact the ability of the department to effectively manage the allocation of human resources to respond to evolving organisational requirements.

Substantial adverse effect on the operations of an agency

Parts of the Position Descriptions are conditionally exempt as release of the material would, or could reasonably expected to, have a substantial adverse effect on the proper and efficient conduct of the operations of the department (section 47E(d) of the FOI Act).

The Position Descriptions include details about the department's operating environment and priorities, including engagement with foreign governments. Disclosure of this material could reasonably be expected to impact the effectiveness of the roles, particularly with respect to external stakeholders.

Irrelevant material

Some information within the material is irrelevant to, or outside the scope of, your request (section 22(1)(a)(ii) of the FOI Act). In determining what is irrelevant, I have taken note of the email you received from the department on 16 September 2020, in which you were invited to respond if you required the names and contact details of government officials not in the Senior Executive Service (SES). As you have not stated that you require this information, I have decided to remove them from the documents being released to you.

Conditional exemptions - public interest considerations

As <u>sections 47E(c)</u> and <u>47E(d)</u> of the FOI Act are conditional exemptions, I have also considered whether providing access to the material in question would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest (<u>section 11A(5)</u> of the FOI Act). In assessing the public interest, I have considered the FOI guidelines referred to above and the public interest factors favouring disclosure including, promoting the objects of the FOI Act, informing debate on a matter of public importance, and promoting effective oversight of public expenditure.

I have also considered the public interest factors against disclosure including, prejudicing the management functions of the department.

On balance, I am of the view that the public interest is weighted against the disclosure of this material. I find that is this the case for the conditional exemptions under <u>sections</u> 47E(c) and 47E(d) of the FOI Act.

In forming this view, I have not taken into account any of the irrelevant factors specified in section 11B(4) of the FOI Act.
