## LIBLRAL DEMOCRATIC PARTY (LDP)

## CONSTITUTION

## 1. IDENTITY AND STANDING

1.1. This Constitution identifies and governs the Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) in Australia, herealter referred as the "Party".
1.2. All members and bodies of the Party are jointly and severally bound by this Constitution.
1.3. No division or body of the Party may adopl any rule, policy or procedure inconsistent with this Constitution except as required by law.

## 2. PRINCIPLES

2.1. The Litoral Democratic Party is a political party that stands for individual liberty, free markets and small government.
2.2. It regards government as the principal threat to these values and therefore seeks to reduce its intrusion into our lives to the lowest level possible consistent with the preservation of a civilised society.
2.3. It aims to restore to individuals the right to make their own choices and to accept responsibility for their consequences, on the basis that they make better decisions than government.
2.4. The following Principles represent its enduring values.

- Economic Principles
- Free markets and lireedom of choice
- Free trade in goods, services and capital
- Small government, limited public tax, limited government spending and regulation
- Widespread ownership of private properi:
- Social Principles
- Civil society and voluntecrism
- Civil liberties and individual freedom
- Individual liberty and personal responsibility under the rule of law
- Government Principles
- Constitutional liberal democracy
- Ethical and impartial government under the rule of law
- Devolution of power including decentralised government and competitive federalism
- International Principles
- Free trade in ideas and culture
- Freedom and human rights


## 3. OBJECTIVES

3.1. The objectives of the Parly are to:
3.1.1. Promote the Principles of the Party.
3.1.2. Seek the election of its candidates to the House of Representatives and Senate.

## 4. MEMBERSHIP

## MI:MBIIRSIIIP CATIEGORISS

4.1. There shall be two categories of memoers:
4.1.1. Individual members: Individuals who have applied for and been accepled as members in their own right and not as representatives of an organisation or group.
4.1.2. Affiliate members: Organisations that have applied for and been accepted as affiliate members, provided that the individuals who belong to such organisations shall not become individual members of the Party by virtue of their membership of that organisation.
4.2. Subject to this Constitution the National Executive may create categories of individual and alfiliate membership and shall establish procedures for admission, suspension and expulsion of members.

InIIVIDUAL MEMBFRSIIIP
4.3. Individual membership of the Parly is open to any person who has not been expressly excluded from membership and who agrees to comply with this Constitution.
4.4. Individual membership includes membership of both the Federal party and the State Division to which the applicant is, by virtue of his or her residence, entitled to belong.
4.5. Only individual members shall be garded as members for the purpose of meeting the requirements of Commonwealth and State legislation with respect to membership of the Parly.
4.6. Only individual members recognised as "Financial" by the National Executive shatl be entitled to vote on Party matters, hold party positions or be selected as party candidates. Individual members so recognised shall have one vote each.
4.7. An individual member who loses or relinquishes Financial status may nonetheless remain a member of the Party if he/she so chooses.

Affilinte Mlembersiap
4.8. Affiliate membership of the Party is open to any organisation that has not been expressly excluded from membership and agrees to comply with this Constitution.
4.9. Aftiliate members shall be entitled to vote on Party matters according to the number of votes allocated by the National Executive from line to time.
4.10. The National Executive shall not permit the votes of affiliate members, in aggregate, to exceed thirly-three percent of the number of individual financial members of the party.

4.11. Applications for membership shall be in a manner prescribed by the National Executive.
4.12. The National Executive or a relevant State Executive may reject any application for membership (individual or affiliate) on the ground that its aceeptance would be against the interests of the Party.
4.13. Any refusal to admit a person as an individual member, and any suspension or expulsion of a member, shall be accompanied by a statement of reasons which is made available to parly members.
4.14. A person ceases to be a member of the Party if he or she dies, resigns or is expelled from the Party.
4.15. A member may at any time by notice in writing to the Seeretary resign his/her membership.
4.16. If a member of the Party ceases to be a member, the Secretary must make an appropriate entry in the register of members recording the date on which membership ceased.
4.17. Membership entitlements are not translerable A right, privilege or obligation which a person or organisation has by reason of being a member of the Parly is not capable of being transferred or transmitted to another person or organisation, and terminates on cessation of membership.
4.18. The liability of a member of the party to contribute towards the payment of the debts and liabilities of the party or the costs, charges and expenses of the winding up of the party is limited to the amount, if any, unpaid by the member in respeet of membership of the party.
4.19. The liability of members of the Party s governing bodies shall be the same as for ordinary members.

## 5. PARTY ORGANISATION

## NATIONAI, Exi:CUTIVI:

5.1. There shall be one National Executive, comprised of nine individual members duly elected in accordance with this Constitution.
5.2. Members of the State Exccutive shall serve for a period of three years and, upon expiry of the term, are eligible for re-election.
5.3. The National Executive shall be the principal governing body of the party, with authority to:
5.3.1. Promote the party's Principles.
5.3.2. Improve public perceptions of the Party.
5.3.3. Select candidates for Federal elections.
5.3.4. Set membership lees.
5.3.5. Formulate and adopt lederal policies consistent with the Principles of the Party.
5.3.6. Form such permanent or temporary committees as may from time to time be required.
5.3.7. Make, repeal and amend such by-laws as are from time to time considered necessary for the well being of the Party.
5.3.8. Establish procedures for the resolution of disputes and disciplining of members based on the principles of procedural fairness and natural justice.
5.3.9. Exereise all such functions as may be exercised by the Party, other than those functions required by this Constitution to be excreised by a General Meeting of members.
5.3.10. Perform all such acts and do an such things as appear to be necessary or desirable for the proper management of the affairs of the Party.
5.4. The National Executive shall:
5.4.1. Receive and consider motions and recommendations from National Conferences.
5.4.2. Recommend to the National Conference the appointment of an auditor.
5.4.3. Present policies it has adopted to the National Conference for ratification or rejection.
5.4.4. Retain control over all party funds other than those raised by or donated to a subordinate body of the party for use by that body.
5.5. No member of the party, including individual members of the National Executive, shall have the authority to act or speak on behalf of the Party without the approval of the National Executive.

## State Divisions

5.6. There shall be a Division of the Party in each State or territory.
5.7. Each Division shall have its Jwn Constitution which shall be subject 10 and not inconsistent with this Constitution.
5.8. Each Division shall have a State Executive whith shall be the governing body of the party in that State or territory.

## NATIONAL COUNCIL

5.9. There shall be one National Council comprised of each member of the National Execulive, up to three members of the State Executive of each Division plus the Party's elected members of parliament (state or federal).
5.10. The role of the National Councol is to provide a means of resolving disagreement between the National Executive and a State Executive or between State Executives.
5.11. A matter shall only be considered by the National Council where:
5.11.1. A disagreement exists between the National Executive and a State Executive, or between two or more State Exccutives; and
5.11.2. The disagreement relates to:
5.11.2.1. An issue of policy not conlined to the lederal jurisdiction; or
5.11.2.2. A financial matter; or
5.11.2.3. A matter on which the partics in dispute (being National and/or State Executives), have agreed to refer to the National Council and accept its decision.
5.12. The quorum for meetings of the National Council shall be eight.
5.13. The National Council may appoint its own Chairman when it meets or, if it lails to do so, the National President or his nominee shall be Chairman.
5.14. All matters before the National Council shall be decided by a simple majority of those present except where this Constitution provides otherwise. Where a vole is tied the Chairman shall have a casting vote.
5.15. Decisions of the National Council shall be final.

## 6. Office Bearers

6.1. The National Executive shall elect from among its members the office-bearers of the Party, being:

National President
National Viec-President
National Secretary
National Assistant Secretary
National Treasurer
National Communications Ofticer
National Registered Officer
6.2. No more than two olfice-bearer positions may be filled by one member of the National Executive, exeept that this limitation stall not apply to the position of National Registered Officer.
6.3. The National President shall:

### 6.3.1. Be the Senior Execulive Officer of the Peity.

6.3.2. Chair all National Execulive and National Conference meetings of the Party.
6.3.3. Be a member "ex officio" of all committees.
6.4. The National Vice-President shall:
6.4.1. Periorm the duties of the President during his/her absence or at his/her request.
6.4.2. Be a member "cx oflicio" of all committees.
6.5. The National Secretary shall:
6.5.1. Have overall responsibility for correspondence in connection with the Party.
6.5.2. Ensure the maintenance of a register of members as directed by the National Executive.
6.5.3. Record all appointments of office-bearers and members of the National Executive.
6.5.4. Ensure that minutes are taken of all proceedings at National Executive meetings and general meetings of the Party including the National Conference.
6.5.5. Present such minules to the subsequent corresponding meeting for approval as a true and accurate record, have them signed by the chairman of that meeting and retained as its principal record.
6.6. The National Treasurer shall:
6.6.1. Have overall responsibility for the care of the Parly"s finances.
6.6.2. Ensure that all monies collected are promptly paid into a bank account approved by the National Executive.
6.6.3. Ensure that all payments authorised by the National Executive are made.
6.6.4. Ensue that correct accounts are kept showing the financial atfairs of the Party, including full delails of receipts and expenci.:ure.
6.6.5. Ensure the maintenance of an accurate and current register of Party assets.
6.6.6. Present to each meeting of the National Executive a statement of income and expenditure for the period since the prior meeting.
6.6.7. Present each year to the approved auditor the Party's accounts for auditing.
6.6.8. Present at the National Conference a duly audited balance sheet and a profit and loss account covering the financial year immediately preceding the National Conlerence.
6.7. The National Communications Officer shall:
6.7.1. Have overall responsibility for communications with members and the public.
6.7.2. Ensure that regular communications are maintained with members.
6.8. The National Registered Ofticer: shall undertake such functions on behalf of the Party as are required by legislation.
6.9. The National Executive shall direct the National Registered Officer as to the nomination of candidates for elected office and the Registered Olficer shall comply with such direction.

## 7. Meetings of the National Executive

7.1. Meetings of the National Executive shall be held at such times and places as the National Executive shall determine:

### 7.1.1. At leasi twice each financial year; or

7.1.2. Within fourteen (14) day of the receipt by the Secretary of a requisition by a majority of members of the National Executive.
7.2. Five members of the National Executive, one of who is the President or Vice-President, shall form a quorum.
7.3. Not less than two (2) days notice shall be given for a meeting of the National Executive.
7.4. The National Executive may appoint its own Chairman when it meets or, if it fails to do so, the National President or his nominee shall be Chairman.
7.5. All matters before the National Executive shall be decided by a simple majority of those present except where this Constitution provides otherwise. Where a vote is tied the Chairman shall have a casting vote.
8. Election of National Executive
8.1. Elections for vacancies on the National Executive shall be conducted at the National Conlerence.
8.2. Only members present at the National Conference and eligible to vote shall be permitted to vote. There shall be no proxy votes.
8.3. Nominations for election to the National Executive shall be submitted to the Secretary not less than two weeks prior to the National Conlerence.
8.4. A casual vacancy on the National Executive msy be filled by the National Executive until the next National Conference when it shall be filled by election. The term of any member so elected shall be the remainder of the term of the member whose departure created the casual vacancy.
8.5. Members standing for election to the National Executive must be nominated and seconded by financial members and signily their consent to the nomination.
8.6. The method of voting for the National Executive shall be optional preferential, conducted
by secret ballot.
8.7. Candidates for election to the National Executive may each appoint one scrutineer to observe the counting of votes.
8.8. A Returning Officer may be appointed to conduct the election, who shall not be entitled to vote.
8.9. A member of the National Executive may be removed by a unanimous vote of all other members of the National Executive on two occasions not less than wo or more than lour months apart:

## 9. General Meetings

9.1. There shall be one General Meeting each year known as the National Conference, to be held at a time and place determined by the National Executive.
9.2. Special General Meetings may be called by the National Executive and shall be called if requested by a petition carrying the signatures of not less than 20 percent of individual voting members. Such meetings shall be held no sooner than one week nor later than six weeks from the date when the request was received.
9.3. All members shall be entitled to attend a general meeting. However, only financial members shall be entitled to vote.
9.4. The Secretary shall ensure that all members are notified of each General Meeting not less than four weeks prior to its occurrence.
9.5. All matters for decision at a General Meeting shall be submitted to the Secretary not less than two weeks prior to the meeting.
9.6. General Meetings shall be open to observers unless closed (entirely or for certain sessions) by decision of the National Executive or resolution of the meeting.
9.7. The agenda for the National Conference shall be as determined by the National Executive but shall include the following:
9.7.1. A report by the President.
9.7.2. A report by the Secretary.
9.7.3. Receipt and consideration of the minutes of the prior National Conference.
9.7.4. Receipt and consideration of the 'Treasurer's report including financial accounts.
9.7.5. Elections to fill such vacancies on the National Executive as fall due.
9.7.6. The appointment of an auditor.
9.7.7. Consideration of policies adopted by the National Executive and their approval or rejection without amendment.
9.8. There shall be no quorum for general meetings.
9.9. Unless proper notice has not been given or the holding of the meeting is seriously hampered by events beyond the control of the National Secretary or National Executive, general meetings shall not be adjourned.

## 10. AMENDMENTS TO TIIE CONSTTTUTION

10.1. This Constitution may be changed by:
10.1.1. A motion on notice from the National Executive to a general meeting; and
10.1.2. Approval of that motion by ninety (90) percent of votes cast at the general meeting in the case of a change to the Principles, or seventy-five (75) percent majority in any other case.
