
TRIBUTE TO A DISTINGUISHED CHAMPION OF IPAA



If there is any Australian Public Service role that could easily verge on being political, it's that of the Secretary of the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet.

Toxic narratives of public service drown out needed change

Wednesday November 3, 2021

The post-estimates period is a chance for my team to breathe again, perhaps even more so than it is for the senior public servants who front the hearings and the many others who spend weeks pulling together information from their area regarding whatever senators are likely to ask about.

It's anecdotal, but to me it felt like this time politics dominated even more than in previous hearings. There's only so many ways to ask for the modelling underpinning a policy to be produced, but we sure heard a great many ways of saying no, from ministers and senior officials alike.

Senators don't see the line managers who make the magic happen in operations, policy, front-line, commercial and other areas, but nothing would be achieved without them. The political discourse around them is so consistently toxic, it's a wonder any talent has stayed at all.

There are the routine "Canberra bubble" and "fat-cat bureaucrat" stories, implying that

because the salary gap between chief executive and entry level is smaller in the public service than the commercial world, then anyone with a couple of years of APS experience could be on something like the remuneration of Phil Gaetjens.

Half those line managers included in generalised sledging of the “Canberra elites” don’t work in the ACT at all. I’m no longer surprised when I learn that a government project team I’ve been engaging with has people working in three or more states. Their “new normal” is more reflective of the lives of the Australian workforce than a Parliament that [forces its members to fly into a COVID hotspot to qualify for a say in decisions](#).

The Prime Minister has, as his years in the job advance, been less and less inclined to praise or even acknowledge the work of public servants, when compared with his predecessors. His limited addresses to the sector have dismissed them as policy idea generators, and even suggested that [stagnating their wages would be a strong motivator to deliver on his government’s intentions](#).

The number of consultants, contractors and other external workforces have grown so large they are now threatening the viability of some portfolio and agency budgets. But if the next generation wants to be part of policymaking, it’s [as likely to happen in the favoured consulting firms of ministers as it is in the public sector](#). Time will tell if the APS Academy and reform program will come up with the needed ingredient to draw talent back from what looks increasingly like the better option.

Last week’s [open letter to the APS](#) from PM&C boss Mr Gaetjens and Public Service Commissioner Peter Woolcott suggested a highly traditional view of the service remains in place: returning to the office and old ways of working with colleagues. Some flexible work will remain necessary, though, as part of one stated goal for 2022 to implement the government’s post-COVID recovery plan.

New research [published this week by scholars from Australia, New Zealand and Brazil in the *Australian Journal of Public Administration*](#) has something to say about building leadership up in such circumstances. Five categories of growth-oriented leadership were identified: managing the whole team, enabling self-management, recognising individual needs and contributions, supporting both career and personal growth, and managing safe failures.

These discussions, along with the non-people sides of service transformation, have fallen by the wayside - both politically and internally - as the APS becomes increasingly mission-focused and less future-focused due to budget constraints, politicisation and the all-consuming attention of the pandemic.

The [IPAA National Conference](#) at the end of this month in Brisbane and online might help kick those conversations off again. Someone needs to.





But the [announcement included a few shock announcements too](#).

With Kristina Keneally and Terri Butler losing seats on election night, the frontbench had at least two key portfolios - Home Affairs and Environment - up for grabs.

The red books prepared for the two senior Labor figures likely underwent hasty edits following Saturday's results but few would have seen what was coming.

Tanya Plibersek was shuffled over to Environment while [campaign star Jason Clare gained the Education portfolio](#).

And Clare O'Neil scored Home Affairs, despite earlier speculation Brendan O'Connor was in the

running.

It means incoming ministers will come to the roles with fresh perspectives and a willingness to get brought up to speed on the new areas they will now oversee.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese also delivered an expected but considerable announcement this week about who will run the Prime Minister's department for the next five years.

Mr Albanese made it no secret he was unlikely to keep Scott Morrison's former chief of staff, Phil Gaetjens, who was appointed to lead PM&C in 2019.

The former PM&C secretary drew criticism in the role, including after he was tasked with an inquiry into when staff in the prime minister's office found out about details of Brittany Higgins' allegations and a look at the "sports rorts" affair when Bridget McKenzie was minister.

Professor Glyn Davis was announced as the new head to steer PM&C, and he brings with him decades of experience in higher education roles.

The experienced public servant also played a role in David Thodey's landmark review into the public service - many of its recommendations were dismissed by the former government.

It will be a space to watch as Public Service Minister Katy Gallagher has been supportive of many of Thodey's recommendations.

It's still unclear whether any major machinery of government will be announced but speculation of minor changes to the Attorney-General's Department and the Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resources has already surfaced.

Whatever the public service may look like after the dust has settled, there's one thing that's for certain - it will face a serious reshaping over the next three years.





Secrecy, sleep-ins, Senate committees: Whirlwind 2021 for the APS

Wednesday December 15, 2021

Over 11-and-a-half months, the public service has wrangled with a number of challenges.

In some ways, it was a continuation of the new normal we all had to adhere to following an unforeseen global pandemic.

But for others, some of the issues that had been bubbling under the surface for years, and were exacerbated by the sector's sudden jolt of forced agility, came to the fore.

Working from home became the norm for large swathes of the public sector in 2020 but despite its popularity, political pressure forced many back into the office once vaccination rates peaked and outbreaks petered out.

Home offices and sleep-ins, once considered the exception, became the rule but now a battle ensues as political leaders put the squeeze on agency heads to bring staff back into the office

and boost local economies.

Some agencies, however, are pushing against the tide, creating a system [where workplace flexibility is determined by the whims of an agency head or department secretary](#).

Staffing caps and a reliance on labour hire has continued [to remain a point of contention with agencies](#) spending big on contractors to take on growing workloads.

Labor-dominated [Senate committees ripped into the Abbott-era policy](#), which caps the number of permanent staff each year but allows agencies to expand considerably with labour hires.

It's left some departments, [such as Veterans' Affairs](#), with a workforce consisting of more than 40 per cent non-ongoing contractors.

But this year presented new challenges too.

Secrecy and transparency soon [became the focus of the political discussions](#) as the days numbered down for a federal integrity commission to be established per a federal election promise.

The Morrison government's proposal [would result in a body unable to investigate previous misconduct or corruption](#) and only able to accept referrals from department heads and ministers.

It's a model staunchly opposed [by independent crossbenchers, the Greens](#) and Labor leaving the establishment of the anti-corruption body [increasingly unlikely ahead of the 2022 federal election](#).

Secrecy has also been a talking point for bureaucracy's freedom of information regime.

South Australian senator, and self-anointed FOI Jedi, Rex Patrick has been on a crusade to tackle cumbersome FOI laws.

His latest [battle is against the Prime Minister and Cabinet's Department](#) after it refused to grant access to documents and meeting minutes despite [Senator Patrick's earlier win at an AAT hearing](#).

The issue has turned into somewhat of a spectacle in recent weeks after [the senator used his parliamentary privilege](#) to name and shame the PM&C public servants who denied his requests.

PM&C secretary Phil Gaetjens - a former chief of staff to Prime Minister Scott Morrison - [has rejected Senator Patrick's claims the central department has become politicised](#), adding that the federal government's interpretation is that the national cabinet is a cabinet committee and is therefore exempt from FOI requests.

So, where to in 2022?

As always, the government will pick up in late January where it left in mid-December but only for a short period.

A federal election is due by May 21, though a March election is still not quite out of the realm of possibility.

Depending on the outcome of the election, we could see a reshaped public service or a continuation of the same.

Labor has promised a net zero APS by 2030, though it concedes Defence and national security agencies - which represent 60 per cent of the bureaucracy's emissions - will be excluded.

An audit of labour hire firms to equalise pay between permanent and temporary staff has also been promised by Labor if it's successful at the upcoming election.

There's also the possibility, as with any change of government, for more MOGs.

A Coalition win will signal its continuation of having an agile, adaptable workforce through the use of labour hire. Assistant Attorney-General Amanda Stoker has also committed to reforming the Public Interest Disclosure Act in response to a 2016 review by Philip Moss.

But with months to go, the public service will not sit idly awaiting polling day.

With new variants of COVID-19 popping up and a gradual re-opening back up to the world, there'll be plenty of hard work in between.

There's also an early federal budget scheduled for March 2022.

For good reason, public servants should be particularly eager to soak up this summer break before the six-month slog ahead.

As Parliament rises....

6 December 2019

Hi everyone

A quick blog this week, as time is tight.

Yesterday marked the end of the Parliamentary year, and as I write I am about to go up to the House to appear before the Senate Economics Legislation Committee's inquiry into the performance of the Inspector-General of Taxation. This will be our last appearance before a Parliamentary committee for the year.

All I really wanted to say today is this: thank you to everyone in the office who helped prepare either me or my senior colleagues for appearances before Committees in 2019. There have been a lot of them, particularly since the election, spanning our law enforcement oversight work, the creation of an Integrity Commission, whistleblowing and media freedom, the NDIS, Centrelink debt issues, the regular Estimates process, a broad inquiry into how service delivery is done in the APS, as well as some appearances before ACT Assembly committees. We have tabled numerous reports, responded to QONs and otherwise assisted the Parliament in various ways. Although I don't take this morning's upcoming appearance for granted (sidebar: I never, ever do), I think we have acquitted ourselves well and, in so doing, exercised useful systemic influence, as is our purpose.

Another end of year thing this week was Phil Gaetjens' address to the APS which happened yesterday (Phil is head of PM&C) – a noteworthy element of which is that it coincided with the PM's announcement of major MOG changes and changes to Secretary arrangements. Five Secretaries will depart the service. Suggest you familiarise yourself with the new structures and I will think about who to engage with, and how, as we approach 2020.

Look forward to seeing many of you at the Canberra Christmas Party.

The new normal number 2

8 May 2020

Hi everyone

It's been a busy week, hasn't it? This week we appeared before a Parliamentary Committee for the first time in a few months, and there is another next week. Met senior folks at the NDIA to talk about the Participant Service Guarantee, signed off a report about the adequacy of recruit training in the ADF, am about to read our quarterly report as ACT Ombudsman, and engaged with a host of other topics.

Today, I particularly want to highlight three things. First – you may have noticed the open letter to the APS from Phil Gaetjens (Secretary PM&C) and Peter Woolcott (APS Commissioner) encouraging APS employees to download the CovidSafe App. You would be as aware as I am about the media and political commentary about the App. All I would add is that: (i) I've downloaded it, in fact I did so within an hour of it becoming available to see whether I could figure out how, and even I found it easy; (ii) it seems to me that the risks of doing so are negligible, and the potential community health benefits far outweigh the risk – all the more so as we start to think about returning to more normal activities, including at the workplace. So I encourage you to download it too.

Second, on Wednesday, Rodney and I enjoyed a rare interpersonal outing with colleagues, ie our team members who are down at Services Australia processing JobSeeker claims. What a job they have done, and good on them! The vast backlog of claims has been worked through in extraordinary time, putting money in the pockets of hundreds of thousands of people who are now unemployed. It was great to catch up with the team, get a sense of the work, the people they've been working with, the systems they work on, and life in Tuggeranong. The work has gone more quickly than expected, with the input of many, many public servants from 40 different agencies, so we can expect to see our colleagues back around the end of May. Here's a shot of our gathering.

Third, as I write the National Cabinet is contemplating the lifting of various kinds of restrictions. No doubt we will all hear more about that later today, but what I'd like to communicate to you is simply this: as an office we need to carefully, methodically, sensibly start to unwind the restrictions we've been placing on ourselves, start planning to bring people back into the office, in a way that is safe, and in a way that is calibrated to the opening of the broader economy and based on the best advice. Our focus on that will intensify in the coming weeks, but I emphasise the words gradual, careful, methodical.

Finally – a quick shout out to everyone in Perth office who are moving out of our current premises today, working from home for a bit, and returning to new serviced accommodation on or about the 18th. Best wishes during the transition and thanks for your forbearance.





